# ve years on...

For this issue of Talkback we've been talking to Iris Dixon - one of first tenants. It was 1981 when Iris, her husband Jim and their daughter moved from Brixton to their new home in Isabella Drive, and several of the houses were still being built.

In those days the homes were owned by Utopian Housing Association and Iris says their attitudes to tenants was very different from Keniston's. "There were so many rules and regulations – it was quite regimental" she says. "They were very strict about pets and we didn't think they were going to let us bring our dog."

That would have been really difficult for Iris, who is a real animal lover. She has two lovely Jack Russels now, as well as rescue horses at a nearby field. Her love of animals extends to painting them in watercolours, and her paintings are so good that she used to earn a living as an animal watercolourist, including painting police dogs for the Metropolitan Police.

The housing association flat they had rented in Brixton was in considerable disrepair – subsidence had caused an enormous crack to appear in the bedroom wall, so big she could talk to her neighbour through it! The couple have a disabled daughter who needed a safe, secure home and, since Iris had family at Green Street Green, they decided to move out to Darrick Wood. It meant Iris's husband, who was a postman in Brixton, had to commute back to London every day, but they love the area and the estate so much they're really pleased they made the move.

"The people are really lovely" says Iris. "There's a real community here and several of us have been here since the start – we've seen the kids grow up and have families of their own." She says when they first arrived, the group of houses they were part of was known as 'Little Posh Square!'

The sense of community, coupled with her love of animals, has helped Iris through some difficult times in her life. The couple's daughter has cerebral palsy and needs a lot of help and care. It's been a struggle at times, but Iris is a strong woman who's not afraid to fight for the best for her daughter, who attends the Astley day centre. Iris worries about the future for Lisa when she and Jim are no longer around, as so many residential assisted living units have been closed down recently.

Iris loves her home in Isabella Drive, as do her husband and daughter. Jim is a really good gardener, but she also really appreciates the Keniston staff gardeners, such as Barry (pictured here with Iris and profiled later in this issue). When one of Iris's beloved dogs died a few years ago, one of the gardeners made a new bed in his memory. The dog was called Joe and Iris was incredibly moved when the gardener turned up with a rose he'd bought for the new bed. The rose was called 'My Joe."

Iris says there are some really nice people on the estate, both young and old, and some wonderful people at Keniston too. She's so pleased she made the move those thirty five years ago!

### Right to Buy update

We promised to keep you up to date on the situation regarding the proposed legislation giving housing association tenants the Right to Buy their homes. Things are still up in the air at the moment, so we don't have much to tell you, but the issue is currently being debated in the House of Lords. Housing associations are working with the Government on the finer details of the proposal and five associations are running a pilot to find out the best ways of implementing the scheme.


